Method of Play 72-hole, stroke-play Championship, 18 holes daily. There is a cut after 54 holes to the low 30 boys and low 30 girls plus ties. In the event of a tie after 72 holes, there will be a hole-by-hole playoff.

Rules and Regulations The Rules of Golf, which govern play, are determined by the United States Golf Association and applied by the PGA of America Board of Directors. The Championship is subject to the overall supervision of the Board and the PGA Rules Committee.

Eligibility Boys and girls, under 19 years of age and who have not yet begun college, may attempt to qualify through their local PGA Sections. The boys and girls field for the finals is comprised of one boy and one girl champion from each of the 41 Sections, one boy and one girl champion from all PGA Junior Series events prior to the Junior PGA Championship, winners of selected national junior tournaments conducted earlier in the year, Golfweek, Junior Golf Scoreboard and Polo national rankings, and past Junior PGA Championship winners who have not reached their 19th birthdays.

A History of Showcasing Tomorrow's Stars

One of golf's major championships for juniors, the Junior PGA Championship is where the best in the world get their start.

Begun in 1976, at Walt Disney World Resort in Orlando, Fla., the Championship has been a popular stop on the national junior circuit for many of today's PGA and LPGA touring professionals.

The Junior PGA Championship moved to Callaway Gardens in Mountain View, Ga., in 1978, and two years later was played at PGA National Golf Club in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., which would eventually host 19 Championships over the next two decades.

The Championship also visited Bellerive Country Club in St. Louis, Mo., in 1988 and Pinehurst (N.C.) Resort & Country Club in 1993. The Championship returned to PGA National Golf Club in 1994 and remained at the site until 2001. The Maxfli Golf Division served as title sponsor of the Junior PGA Championship from 1991 to 1999.

Westfield Insurance, one of the country's premier insurance carriers, became title sponsor from 2001-2007, and elevated the Championship to yet another level.

In 2011, the Junior PGA Championship makes its second consecutive visit to Indiana at Sycamore Hills Golf Club in

Fort Wayne. This season marks the second year of presenting sponsorship for Under Armour and the debut of Heritage F.S.E.

The Junior PGA Championship has been a parade of star performers. Past competitors who have gone on to successful professional careers include: Billy Andrade, Kathy Baker, Brandie Burton, Stewart Cink, Chris Couch, Rick Fehr, Jim Gallagher Jr., Trevor Immelman, Cristie Kerr, Anthony Kim, Justin Leonard, Billy Mayfair, Michelle McGann, Phil Mickelson, Sean O'Hair, Grace Park, In-Bee Park, Dottie Pepper, Stacy Prammanasudh, Scott Verplank, Willie Wood and Tiger Woods.

Alexis Thompson of Coral Springs, Fla., sealed her legacy at the Junior PGA by winning her second title in 2009, cruising to a 12-stroke triumph, one stroke off the all-time record, set by Debbie Hall, who posted a 13-stroke victory in 1977.

The 14-year-old Thompson, who was already competing in her fourth Junior PGA Championship, finished in the top 3 in each of the last three Junior PGA Championships.

In 2007, the 12-year-old Thompson became the youngest champion in Championship history.

With his win at the 2008 Masters Tournament, South African Trevor Immelman became just the second boys' division winner of the Junior PGA Championship to also win a major championship. In addition, Immelman (1996) became the second to achieve PGA Tour Rookie of the Year honors.

David Toms, the 1984 Junior PGA Championship, also won the 2001 PGA Championship at Atlanta Athletic Club.

With her victory at the 2008 U.S. Women's Open, In-Bee Park of Henderson, Nev. and South Korea, became the third girls' division winner of the Junior PGA Championship to also earn a major championship.

Park joined a select group that included Cristie Kerr of Scottsdale, Ariz., winner of the 1995 Junior PGA Championship and the 2007 U.S. Women's Open; and Grace Park of Scottsdale, winner of the 1996 Junior PGA Championship and the 2004 Kraft Nabisco Championship.

In 2005, former Junior PGA Champion Sean O'Hair (1998) became the first Junior PGA Champion to achieve PGA Tour Rookie of the Year honors. There have been four LPGA Rookies of the Year to come from the Junior PGA Girls' Champion or runner-up positions: 1985 Penny Hammel (1978 Champion); 1991 Brandi Burton (1988 Champion); 2000 Dorothy Delasin (1998 runner-up); and 2002 Beth Bauer (1997 Champion).

In 2002, former Junior PGA Champion Ty Tryon of Orlando, Fla., became the youngest player (age 17) to earn a PGA Tour fully exempt playing card.

In 1990, Vicki Goetz-Ackerman, of Hull, Ga., became the first participant to win three Junior PGA Championships (1987, '89, '90). Beth Bauer of Valrico, Fla. (1994, '97), the late Heather Farr (1980, '82) of Phoenix, Ariz., Aree Song Wongluekiet (1999, 2000) of Eustis, Fla./Thailand, are the other competitors who have captured more than one Junior PGA Championship.

2010 Junior PGA Championship Summary

McCarthy, Isagawa make final-round charges to capture Titles in Indiana at 35th Junior PGA Championship

The final round of the 35th Junior PGA Championship presented by Under Armour was punctuated by a three-hole playoff that saw Cassy Isagawa of Wailuku, Hawaii, emerge as the girls' division champion, while Denny McCarthy of Burtonsville, Md., claimed the boys' division title by three strokes at Sycamore Hills Golf Club in Fort Wayne, Ind.

After rain washed out second-round play and halted the action for more than an hour on the third day, the sun returned and drama reached a fever pitch in a Championship trimmed to 54 holes.

Isagawa and Ginger Howard of Bradenton, Fla., each two strokes back of Kyle Roig of Puerto Rico heading into the final round, closed with matching scores of 3-under-par 69 today to force the tie.

"It was stressful and the playoff was no different," said Isagawa. "I didn't know how Ginger was doing most of the day and thought maybe I do have a chance to win this thing."

After both Isagawa and Howard parred the opening playoff hole (No. 18), Isagawa nearly claimed the title on No. 17, but lipped out for par.

"I was really nervous all three holes, I have never been that nervous in my whole life," said Howard. "When my putt lipped out on 17, I told myself it's OK, I have 18, I have played this hole enough this week."

On the third playoff hole, both players hit solid drives on the demanding par-4 18th and both then left their second shots

right of the green in the thick rough. Howard, deeper in the rough and with a much tougher angle to the pin, chipped to 18 feet and missed her par putt. Isagawa pitched to five feet and sank the putt for her first Junior PGA Championship title.

"Having the same putt three times in a row on 18, I should end up making it," said Isagawa.

Howard, who was competing in just her first Junior PGA Championship, was proud of how she played and was satisfied with her overall performance under the immense pressure.

"I have no regrets and I am really proud of myself," said Howard. "I came back from shooting a 76 the first day and almost won."

In the boys' division, McCarthy, who was three strokes back of second round leader Oliver Schniederjans of Powder Springs, Ga., played a wild round of golf that did not produce a par until the 8th hole.

"I was seven shots back after the first round and I knew I was going to have to fire at pins these last two days to have any shot," said McCarthy, who made a commitment to the University of Virginia. "I went into attack mode, and that made for some great shots but also made for some bad shots."

Those shots were on full display at Sycamore Hills during the final round, as he recorded four birdies, an eagle and two bogeys on his first seven holes.

"The course really played tough and the pins were not easily accessible," said McCarthy. "When the wind picked Oliver [Schniederjans] struggled a bit and I caught fire a little. It felt good out there."

McCarthy took home the Jack Nicklaus Trophy and cruised to victory on the back nine, leading by as many as four strokes. Anthony Paolucci of Del Mar, Calif., the 2008 Junior PGA Champion, closed with a 68 to finish alone in second overall.

Schniederjans struggled to a final round 75 and finished in a tie for third with Wyndham Clark of Greenwood Village, Colo., four strokes back of McCarthy.

"I have learned a lot from my final rounds," said Schniederjans. "But I guess I have got to learn more."

The course average in the boys' division for the final round was 74.25, the lowest of the Championship. The course average in the girls' division was 76.01, also the lowest of the Championship.
