Defending Champion: United States

Prize Money and Honors No prize money is awarded to the PGA Cup competitors. Members of both teams compete solely for their country and their country's right of possession of the Llandudno International Golf Trophy.

Method of Play Identical to that of the Ryder Cup: match play, including foursomes (two-man teams in alternate shot), four-ball (two-man teams in better ball) and singles (18 holes at match play).

Rules and Regulations The Rules of Golf, which govern play, are determined by the United States Golf Association and applied by The PGA of America.

2011 U.S. Eligibility Must be a member in good standing of The PGA of America. United States and Great Britain & Ireland Teams will be determined following the completion of the respective PGA Professional National and Glenmuir PGA Championship.

Membership on the 2011 PGA Cup Team will be forfeited should the player subsequently become reclassified as a Tour professional or any other ineligible classification.

United States PGA Cup Team

Members of the 2011 United States Team are determined over a two-year points system, based on performances in the 2010 and 2011 PGA Professional National Championships. The 2011 U.S. Team will be announced June 29, following the PGA Professional National Championship in Hershey, Pa.

Great Britain & Ireland PGA Cup Team

Great Britain & Ireland Captain: Russell Weir, Dunoon, Scotland

The 2011 Great Britain & Ireland Team will be determined following the conclusion of the Glenmuir PGA Championship, June 14-17, 2011, on the PGA National Course at The Belfry in Sutton Coldfield, England.

The Llandudno International Golf Trophy

The scars of a tumble from long ago are no longer visible under its lid. The Llandudno International Golf Trophy, the prize of the winning team of the PGA Cup, looks as good as new today. You can credit the silversmith, Samuel Pitt & Company near Birmingham, England, for performing a minor face-lift on the 72-year-old, 18-pound piece of hardware.

Named after one of the largest ports in Wales, the Llandudno Trophy incurred a small dent, which had been carried since World War II on the underside of its lid, until it was finally repaired. However, the legend lives on.

First awarded to England in 1939, the trophy was the idea of members of Maesdu Golf Club in Llandudno Conwy County, Wales. It began as the prize to the winning side in the first Home Tournament Series, which featured teams from Ireland, Scotland and Wales. The series was abolished with the outbreak of World War II. Former Great Britain Ryder Cup veteran Percy Alliss (1929, '31, '33, '35, '37), who had served as the captain of England, retired the trophy to his personal collection.



The story of that famous dent is linked to World War II, when Germany's relentless bombing missions against Britain reached a crescendo. During one particular mission to rain havoc upon Southampton and Portsmouth, a German bomber was perilously low on fuel and had to turn its munitions loose on non-targets.

One bomb exploded on the first fairway of Ferndown Golf Club near Bournemouth, less than 50 yards from the Alliss' home. The ensuing tremor was so strong that it rumbled through the neighborhood and anything fragile within nearby homes was in peril.

"My grandmother (Dorothy) kept the trophy on the mantelpiece," said Master Professional Gary Alliss of Sutton Coldfield, England, who served as Great Britain & Ireland Captain in 2007 and '09. "It tumbled to the floor on its head and caused the dent to the lid. After my parents married in 1953, my mother took on the role of guardian and cleaned that trophy for years."

Percy Alliss, who passed away in 1975, ensured that the Llandudno Trophy would be forever secure with the "Home Professionals." In 1972, he and his son, Peter, a former captain of the Professional Golfers' Association, an eight-time Ryder Cup participant and one of BBC's most popular voices of golf, donated the trophy to the Professional Golfers' Association. The trophy would forever be awarded to the winner of the PGA Cup.

History — A Special Cup for the PGA Professional

The PGA Cup originated in 1973 at Pinehurst (N.C.) Country Club as an outgrowth of the PGA Professional National Championship. Structured after the format of the Ryder Cup, with match-play competition between the U.S. and Europe, the PGA Cup features the top PGA club professionals from both sides of the Atlantic. Competition was held annually until 1984, when both countries agreed to hold this event biennially at alternating sites. Proceeds from the PGA Professional National Championship in 1975 at Callaway Gardens, Pine Mountain, Ga., covered the expenses of the U.S. Team for the first overseas PGA Cup. A pro-am event was held prior to the 1975 PGA Cup, which raised \$12,000 and made it possible for the British PGA to stage the competition. Great Britain & Ireland Captain Christy O'Connor Sr., then 51, did his part to keep the event alive, winning the pro-am.

The teams began with nine players, but the rosters were expanded to 10 in 1988. Qualification for America's team is based upon performances in the PGA Professional National Championship. Since 1973, there have been 155 PGA Professionals earning a berth on a U.S. PGA Cup Team, while 129 PGA Professionals have competed for Great Britain & Ireland. From 1973-88, the European team was comprised of PGA club professionals from Great Britain and Ireland. The format was changed from 1990-94, opening up qualifying spots to professionals throughout Europe. The selection process was revised in 1996 to feature only Great Britain & Ireland players.

■ CordeValle — The PGA Cup Returns to California

The PGA Cup, the international showcase event for PGA Professionals, returns to California for the first time since 1977.

The 25th PGA Cup, contested Sept. 16-18, will be contested at CordeValle in the countryside of San Martin, Calif., just 30 minutes south of San Jose. Opened for play in 1999, CordeValle is destined to be the equal of the world's finest golf courses. CordeValle attracted nationwide attention in 2010 and the acclaim of participants, hosting its first PGA Tour event, the Frys.Com Open.

Featuring unobstructed views of natural beauty with dramatic contours and elevation changes, this 18-hole, 7,169-yard, par-72 golf course makes innovative use of Northern California's hillsides, canyons and broad meadows.

Reflecting the belief that championship golf courses are not built just for professional tournaments, CordeValle offers an impressive variety of play.

CordeValle is the outstanding accomplishment of Jones, a designer who is part visionary, part outdoorsman and part golf enthusiast. Given free reign to design CordeValle's championship course, Jones created what many consider one of his greatest masterpieces.

Situated on the gently rolling terrain in a pastoral California valley, the course utilizes the natural elevation changes of its peaks and canyons, enhanced by broad meadows, streams, striking sycamore and mature California oak trees. The land surrounding the course is part of a private preserve with more than 1,000 protected acres, unencumbered by residential or commercial development.

The course features multiple tees and approach angles for varying degrees of difficulty. Strategically placed bunkers with challenging bays, fingers and folds establish the character of the course. An elevation change of approximately 150 feet over the entire 18 holes makes it walkable for the golf purist and demands different strategies and club selections.

CordeValle's golf facilities include a comprehensive learning center directed by PGA Professionals, advanced practice grounds including a multiple-tee, all grass range with target greens and a special short game area for chipping, pitching, putting and sand play. In addition, practice putting greens are located near the first and 10th tees.

"The location had so many great possibilities that it was difficult to decide which to choose," said Jones. "CordeValle is one of those pure 'core golf' experiences. It is perhaps my finest golf course creation."

2009 For more than a year, Brian Whitcomb had taken notes about how he would go about his duties serving as Captain of a PGA Cup Team. He would match 10 PGA club professionals who would be immersed in the cauldron of match-play competition and face the stomach-churning reality of playing for one's country.

Whitcomb, the PGA honorary president from Bend, Ore., completed his short course by seeking counsel from someone whom he watched make a success of such a role on golf's grandest stage - 2008 Ryder Cup Captain Paul Azinger.

Whitcomb met with Azinger, took more notes and then guided the United States against Great Britain & Ireland in the 24th PGA Cup in Scotland.

The Americans' resounding 17½ to 8½ victory over Great Britain & Ireland was as much a tribute to U.S. depth and talent as it was to Whitcomb's ability to bond and blend his players who represented 10 PGA Sections.

"I told my players that if you let me take care of the pairings; let me take care of the worrying and the second-guessing, you only have one job and that's the professional you are playing against," said Whitcomb. "You go about your business, and that is what we did."

The United States found its stride in the singles matches on the final day, winning a record eight of 10 matches and halving another at The Carrick on Loch Lomond.

Sparked by Mark Sheftic of Ambler, Pa., who posted a 6-and-5 victory over reigning Glenmuir PGA Champion James Lee of South Wales for the decisive point, the U.S. went on to register the most points in singles in PGA Cup history and the second-most total points since the biennial showcase event for PGA Professionals began in 1973.

The U.S. returned home with the Llandudno International Golf Trophy, owning a 16-5-3 overall record and having won the PGA Cup for the first time on Scottish soil.

The U.S. opened singles play with a 9-7 advantage, after Great Britain & Ireland stormed back the day before to trim the deficit. "In the end we had 10 strong players, 10 deep," said Whitcomb. "I've been around this game since I was five or six years old and to watch club professionals perform at the level they did, it means the world to me."

"We did it for a great Captain," said Sheftic, PGA assistant professional at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, Pa., and one of six U.S. players to make a PGA Cup debut. "He is one of the most positive persons I've ever met in my life. And, when you see how much he wants to win, you want to win it for him. He's got one of the biggest hearts going."

Sheftic's momentum of an eagle-birdie spurt at the par-5 fifth and par-3 sixth carried him on to the victory.

"It was all about the team, and not about me," said Sheftic. "I got it going early and the front-runners in the line-up and the guys in the middle then took over."

Great Britain & Ireland Captain Gary Alliss, who served for the second consecutive PGA Cup, said that the final-day singles performance by the Americans was not totally surprising.

"They performed as we had expected them to perform," said Alliss, PGA Master Professional at The Belfry in Sutton Coldfield, England. "They were 10 very strong players. I think personally that we didn't putt as well as the U.S. Team. History will show that we were annihilated, and it looks as if we were, even though the margin was tiny in so many of the individual matches. Enormous congratulations to Brian and his team."

The United States opened with a 1-up victory by Sonny Skinner of Sylvester, Ga. over Barry Taylor of St. Helens, England. Skinner, who two-putted from 80 feet for a winning par on the 18th, was the first player off the tee each session for the U.S., and finished 4-0-0 in his debut in the event.

"I wanted to be first off, and I really was pretty relaxed after I got over the ball," said Skinner, who escaped serious injury in Morning Foursomes play on the first day when he jumped from a golf car that was careening into a cavernous fairway bunker.

"I like my team and it's a team atmosphere most of us have not had since college," said Skinner, a 49-year-old PGA teaching professional at River Pointe Golf Club in Albany, Ga. "It really does something for you to play for a team and not for yourself."

Teammate Scott Hebert of Traverse City, Mich., the 2008 PGA Professional National Champion was the top performer on the team with a 5-0-0 record, joined by a powerful threesome of Skinner (4-0-0), Steve Schneider of Sandy, Utah (3-0-0) and Craig Thomas of White Plains, N.Y. (3-1-0).

Hebert parred the 18th hole for a 2-up victory over GB&I veteran Jon Bevan of Weymouth, England.

"I had sloppy tee shots but was able to get the game back to square," said Hebert. "He [Bevan] is a great player and was the guy I wanted to play. As the luck of the draw, I was able to face him."

The lone U.S. singles defeat was weathered by reigning PGA Professional National Champion Mike Small of Champaign, Ill., dropping a 2-and-1 decision to former Walker Cup player Jeremy Robinson of Evesham, England.

"It was always about the team here this week," said Small, the head coach at the University of Illinois. "I would rather be the one loser on a winning team than the one winner on a losing team. As Phil Weaver (Chairman of The Professional Golfers' Association of Great Britain & Ireland) said, 'There's no better honor for a sportsman than playing for your country.'"

Thomas, PGA head professional at Metropolis Country Club in White Plains, N.Y., defeated six-time PGA Cup veteran Paul Wesselingh of Derby, England, 1-up.

He said that he would prefer not to talk about the PGA Cup when he gets home among his fellow Professionals.

"I'm going to tell them it's not that all big of a deal because I don't want them to try so hard," said Thomas, with a big grin. "If they don't practice as much, hopefully I can sneak in under the radar. It was truly something special. The fact that we could come over to Scotland made it that much more special. It was an experience of a lifetime."

23rd PGA Cup

2007 The Georgia Bulldogs may be top dogs in this state, but those boys in pads have nothing on the intensity PGA Golf Professional Ryan Benzel of Bothell, Wash., displayed on a hot Sunday afternoon at The Oconee Course at Reynolds Plantation.

The 28-year-old PGA assistant professional at Seattle Golf Club overcame a three-hole deficit with birdies on his final two holes to claim a vital half-point and lift the United States to a thrilling 13½ to 12½ victory over Great Britain & Ireland in the 23rd PGA Cup.

The premier international event for PGA Golf Professionals lived up to its hype in serving as a showcase for the finest playing members of The PGA of America and The Professional Golfers' Association.

The U.S., which had grabbed a 9-7 lead after two days of four-ball and foursomes competition, earned just the required 4½ points to reclaim the 18-pound Llandudno Trophy, which it had surrendered two years ago in Ireland.

Benzel's halved match against England's Paul Wesselingh was joined by singles victories by Don Yrene of Scottsdale, Ariz., Chip Sullivan of Daleville, Va., Ron Philo Jr. of Amelia Island, Fla., and 50-year-old Chris Starkjohann of Cardiff by the Sea, Calif., who got the honor of making the final point to clinch the cup.

The United States maintained its perfect record on home soil, boosting its record to 10-0-2 since the PGA Cup originated in 1973, and now owns a 15-5-3 overall record.

2005 Erasing a 21-year hex in this 22nd renewal of the PGA Cup, Great Britain & Ireland posted a 15-11 victory over the United States at The K Club's Smurfit Course to win the Llandudno International Golf Trophy for the first time since 1984. The final score was identical to America's triumph in 1992, the last time it competed in Ireland.

In the end, it was fitting that decades of frustration were brought to a close by a Welshman. Matthew Ellis delivered the decisive point in order that his team could carry off a 26-inch high piece of hardware named for one of Wales' largest ports.

The U.S. is 5-5-1 on the road in the premier international competition for PGA Professionals, and 14-5-3 overall in an event patterned after the Ryder Cup.

Though his team needed but one point Sunday to clinch victory, GB&I Captain Jim Farmer of St. Andrews, Scotland, said he expected an all-out American singles attack.

Shut out the previous two days in the four-balls, the Americans proved that singles play is its game. They registered a record 7½ points to GB&I's 2½.

The parade of U.S. players attempting to mount the charge began with Scott Spence of Shorewood, Minn., who faced Wales' Richard Dinsdale, and were all square coming to the 18th green. Both players put an approach in the water, but Spence had reached the green in four, to Dinsdale's five. Spence then ran his par putt eight feet past and missed coming back. Dinsdale two-putted for a double bogey and the halve.

21st PGA Cup

2003 Barry Evans of Charleston, W.Va., contributed the final piece to a near-perfect performance by the United States Team of PGA Professionals in the 21st PGA Cup, closing out his singles match against England's Graeme Bell with a 2-and-1 victory at The PGA Club in Port St. Lucie, Fla. The win gave the U.S. a 19-7 overall triumph that matched the 1990 U.S. Team's 19-7 conquest of Great Britain & Ireland at Kiawah Island, S.C.

Evans' match ended as he was about to line up a 12-foot birdie putt. Bell, who had failed to make his par putt, extended his hand and congratulated his opponent. The victory kept alive a U.S. streak (10-0-2) of never having lost the Llandudno International Golf Trophy on home soil.

The hard work for the U.S. was completed a day early. The Americans had sped to a record 15-1 margin through two days of foursomes and four-ball competition to clinch the necessary 13 points to hold on to the trophy. The U.S. combined for 62 birdies and four eagles to 18 birdies for Great Britain & Ireland.

The closing chapter of the premier international competition for PGA Professionals didn't come without Great Britain & Ireland making its own rally – but too late – in the singles. The visitors closed with a 6-4 performance after having not won a match in the first two days.

Competing in pairs the first two days, the Americans went on a remarkable record 15-1 run on the 7,076-yard South Course.

Americans Rob Labritz of Palm City, Fla., and Tim Thelen of Richmond, Texas, each went 5-0 in the three-day, Ryder Cup-style format. Thelen, PGA head professional at Baywood Country Club in Pasadena, Texas, routed Scotland's Gordon Law, 8 and 6, to tie the all-time singles victory margin.

2000 Jeff Freeman of La Quinta, Calif., who had hoped earlier in the week that he would score the decisive point in the 20th PGA Cup, got his wish under pelting rain at Wentwood Hills Course in Newport, South Wales.

Freeman, the 1999 PGA Professional National Champion, two-putted for par from 40 feet on the 17th hole – his birdie attempt ramming the cup and coming to rest just over two feet away from the hole. Freeman made the comeback putt for a 2 and 1 victory over John Dwyer of County Meath, Ireland. Freeman's efforts gave the United States a 13½ to 12½ victory over Great Britain & Ireland, as the 10-member team of PGA Professionals retained the Llandudno International Trophy for the eighth consecutive time. The U.S. has not lost in the Ryder Cup-style matches since 1984, boasting a 13-4-3 advantage.

"The golf played was excellent," said Great Britain & Ireland Captain David Llewellyn. "We're not disappointed; we just got beat by a point. I thought we were as well prepared as we could be. And we lost by a point. When you lose as a professional, you are never happy. Tomorrow, when we wake up, we will realize it was a great fight, and we can hold our heads up high."

19th PGA Cup

1998 Bob Gaus of St. Louis, Mo., provided the necessary half-point in a singles match against Paul Wesselingh and assured the United States an outright victory over Great Britain & Ireland in the 19th PGA Cup. Gaus, head professional at Tower Tee Golf Center in suburban St. Louis, lost a three-hole advantage over the final four holes on the Broadmoor Golf Club's West Course in Colorado Springs, Colo. But his half-point was enough to push the U.S. past the 13-point plateau and assure an outright victory. With that spark, the U.S. went on to a 17-9 triumph and remained unbeaten on home soil (8-0-2) and 12-4-3 overall.

It was the second highest number of points scored since the PGA Cup began in 1973. Only the 1990 U.S. Team, which posted a 19-7 decision at Kiawah Island, S.C., scored more.

The U.S. won five of its first eight matches on the 7,202-yard West Course that featured slick greens and high rough. The margin was increased to 11½ to 4½ after two rounds and left the singles to determine just how the 1998 U.S. Team would be measured in the overall history of the matches. Great Britain & Ireland put up its best performance in the final 10 singles matches before the U.S. prevailed, 5½ to 4½.

Gaus and reigning PGA Professional National Champion Mike Burke Jr. of Towaco, N.J., finished 3-0-1 in their respective PGA Cup debuts.

1996 In one of the most tightly contested series of matches in any golf competition, the United States team of PGA Professionals forged a 13-13 tie with their Great Britain & Ireland counterparts in a dramatic conclusion to the 18th PGA Cup in Perthshire, Scotland.

For the first time in any PGA of America-sanctioned match-play event, every session ended in a tie. The final round was played in rain, wind and 58-degree temperatures on the Monarch's Course of the renowned Gleneagles resort complex.

Jeff Roth of Flint, Mich., rallied from a two-hole deficit to win the final four holes and give the USA its tie to retain the Llandudno International Trophy. It marked the third tie in the history of the PGA Cup and the first since 1981.

Roth, a 38-year-old PGA Professional at Flint (Mich.) Golf Club, trailed England's Bill Longmuir by two holes before paring the final four holes for a 2-up victory. Roth tapped in a five-foot par putt on the 18th green to complete his rally.

"It was a surreal feeling playing those final holes," said Roth, the 1993 PGA Club Professional Champion. "Any one of our 10 guys could have done what I had to do. I feel fortunate to have answered the bell. There were no losers; I think golf won and these PGA Cup won."

1994 U.S. Captain Dick Smith, the PGA Honorary President, made an emphatic "locker room" speech to his team of PGA Professionals at PGA National Golf Club. Lee then assured the team victory would be complete by downing England's Hogan Stott, 2 and 1.

1990 It was the first time PGA Professionals faced a team that had been expanded to include players from continental Europe. But the deeper and more experienced U.S. Team was set for a rout. In a shining example of sportsmanship during the second day in an afternoon four-ball match, American Dale Fuller reached down and conceded Tim Rastall’s eight-foot par putt on the 18th green. The gesture forced a halve in the match and sent the U.S. into the final-day singles with a 13-3 cushion. The only thing left undecided the final day was the victory margin. The U.S. finished with 19 points and surpassed the 1983 spread of eight points as the greatest winning margin. But the sportsmanship episode took precedence.

“It was the thing to do,” said Fuller. “It was too good a match to come down to an eight-foot putt. They (the European team) are to be commended.” The European team featured seven-time PGA Cup member Brian Waites, 50, and six-time Cup member Brian Barnes. The U.S. contingent featured 1989 PGA Professional National Champion Bruce Fleisher and former PGA Tour player Phillip Hancock, who won three matches together as a team and had a total record of 5-1 overall.

1986 The U.S. team won back the Llandudno International Trophy after an absence of four years, as American depth took its toll throughout the singles round on the final day. Wheeler Stewart of Alexandria, Va., 1984 PGA Professional National Champion Bill Schumaker of Columbus City, Ind., and Kevin Morris of White Plains, N.Y., each scored wins in the singles. Charlie Epps of the U.S. squad and Scotsman Willie Milne, a burly golf-range operator, saved the best for last. They reached the 438-yard 18th hole even. Epps knocked his approach to the middle of the green, while Milne flew his 8-iron approach over the green and his chip shot eight feet past the cup. Epps followed by putting to within inches of the cup. As Milne prepared to replace his ball, Epps stunned players and officials by conceding the eight-footer for a halved match. Milne then gave Epps a bear hug in the middle of the green. In 1986, the format was expanded to four foursomes and four four-ball matches on each of the first two days.

1981 Great Britain & Ireland, led by former schoolboy boxer Michael Steadman, won six of the final-day singles matches to force the second tie in the history of the PGA Cup.

Steadman, the British PGA Club Professional Champion, teamed with fellow countryman John Yeo in the first-day four-balls to defeat the top U.S. team of 1980 PGA Professional National Champion John Traub and Oakmont (Pa.) Country Club PGA Professional Bob Ford. Rallying from a four-hole deficit after nine holes, Steadman and Yeo clawed their way back. They pulled even after 16 holes, and Steadman knocked his approach three feet from the cup on No. 17 for an easy birdie and a 1-up lead. 1979 Any hopes American PGA Professionals had of reclaiming the Llandudno Trophy were quickly thwarted by a veteran Great Britain & Ireland team and icy gale force winds which continually swept across the Isle of Man during two days of the matches. The only U.S. victory in the opening round was the team of 1978 PGA Professional National Champion John Gentile of Westport, Conn., and Jim Ferree of Pittsburgh, Pa. The duo downed the tandem of Jim Farmer and John Morgan, 8 and 6. The hosts took a 6-2 lead into the final-day singles matches, winning six and halving one. Bob Bruno and Ferree were the only U.S. winners in the singles round, and Great Britain & Ireland's David Huish and Peter Butler went unbeaten in three outings.

1978 For the first time in the six-year history of the PGA Cup, the Britons were victorious. It was also the first time in 21 years that a British professional team had beaten the Americans. The last British victory had been the 1957 Ryder Cup victory at Linderick Golf Club in Yorkshire, England. The hosts jumped to a 3-point lead in the first round, led 5-3 after the second and then won 5½ points to sew things up in the singles. Laurie Hammer of Boynton Beach, Fla., and Tom Aycock of Kingsville, Texas, were the only U.S. players to figure in two wins, but fell back in the foursome matches. Rives McBee of Irving, Texas, suffered his first loss in four Cup appearances, losing to Peter Tupling, 2 and 1.

Fifth PGA Cup

1977 The fifth meeting of the U.S. and Great Britain & Ireland club professionals resulted in one of the best duels in PGA Cup history. It was the first time since 1927 that a visiting British Ryder Cup or PGA Cup team didn't go home a loser. The challenging 7,200-yard, Desmond Muirhead-designed course in Palm Springs, Calif., provided the setting. Britain's 38-year-old Jim Kinsella, who was to face open heart surgery in the near future, teamed with David Huish to win a foursome match and came back with a 2-and-1 triumph over Jim Albus. The visitors won six of nine singles matches to force the first deadlock in PGA Cup history. It also was the first time nine singles matches were played, one more than in the previous four matches. Said U.S. Captain Henry Poe, who persuaded the British to consent to nine matches, "I feel strongly that a man who makes the PGA Cup Team should play in the singles."

1976 The fourth consecutive win for U.S. PGA Professionals was crafted in foul weather at the site of the 1929 Ryder Cup in Leeds, England. The Americans opened up a 4-0 lead in the first round of foursome matches, before the British rallied over the next two days to tie, 5½ to 5½, midway through the final round of singles. The evening of the opening day, an arctic front swept in, bringing heavy rain and forcing delay in the start of the second day's four-ball matches. The delay produced a suspension of play because of darkness. The lone U.S. win in four-ball was by Rives McBee and Larry Gilbert, a 1-up win featuring two outstanding recovery shots to beat Brian Waites and David Ingram. Gilbert and McBee also provided wins in the singles round. McBee birdied the 15th hole, after a 3-iron approach landed five feet from the cup, and closed out John Sharkey, 4 and 3, providing the momentum for victories in the next three singles matches.

Third PGA Cup

1975 After two years in the comfort of warm Pinehurst, N.C., the top PGA Professionals of the U.S. and the British Isles met in Southport, England. The matches were renamed the PGA Cup after The PGA of America took over the financing of the U.S. team and expanded the format from two to three days. A pro-am was held prior to the matches, and \$12,000 was raised to allow the British PGA to stage the meeting. The U.S. won three of the four opening foursomes, and each team won one match and halved two in four-ball during the second day. On the last day, the U.S. won four of the final eight singles and halved a fifth match for their third straight Cup victory.

1974 Fresh from the PGA Professional National Championship at Pinehurst, N.C., and having 10 more practice days than their British visitors, the U.S. PGA Professionals cruised to an easy victory in the second annual Diamondhead Cup Matches. Rives McBee of Irving, Texas, joined New Yorker Denny Lyons and John Molenda of Detroit by going unbeaten through both days in team and singles competition. Tommy Jacobs from Rancho La Costa, Calif., finished the matches in excellent form, with a 5-under-par effort to defeat David Huish, 3 and 2.

Scotland's Bobby Jamieson accounted for three of his team's 4½ points, crushing Rex Baxter, 6 and 5, in singles and teaming with David Huish to defeat Stanley Brion and Larry Mancour in the first two rounds.

British Captain Brian Hutchinson expressed hope that the matches would be resumed in 1975 in Great Britain, but in mid-summer to provide acceptable playing conditions. However, the '75 Cup matches were scheduled in October again, due to summer being at the height of the American PGA Professionals' playing and working calendar.

Inaugural PGA Cup

1973 The inaugural Diamondhead Cup matches were a postscript to the PGA Professional National Championship at Pinehurst, N.C. The matches were the brainchild of Bill Maurer of the sponsoring Diamondhead Corporation, then-owner and operator of the Pinehurst Resort. The opening day began with starter Laurie Auchterlonie, honorary professional of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews in Scotland, ordering the players, "Gentlemen, start your engines!" The result was a 2-2 deadlock in foursome matches. The U.S. grabbed the lead for good, 6-2, thanks to inspired play in the four-ball. Don Massengale and Rives McBee each finished unbeaten in three matches. Massengale downed Bryan Hutchinson and McBee defeated Brian Waites by respective 3-and-2 margins in singles. McBee teamed with Dennis Lyons and Massengale with Craig Shankland for victories in foursomes and four-ball competition. Gene Borek and Babe Lichardus each finished 2-0. Borek bounced back from a strained back that had forced his withdrawal from the PGA Professional National Championship.
